**Ketso based creative envisioning:
How can we improve children and young people's
impact on law and policy making?**

Ketso means 'action' in Lesotho, where it was first developed. It is a toolkit and process for effective and creative engagement that can be used in many different ways and contexts, such as engaging with stakeholders, developing partnerships, exploring new ideas, bringing learning to life, enlivening team meetings or creating action plans. It has been refined over two decades of action research with communities across the globe, including working with vulnerable groups like refugees. Ketso has been used successfully to work with children and young people to hear their voices and ideas in a structured, engaging and fun way.

This seminar will introduce you to Ketso through a facilitated workshop, which will explore the question "How can we improve children and young people's impact on law and policy making?" Participants will experience the toolkit in action to develop ideas on the topic, followed by some time to explore how Ketso might be useful in their own work.
